### PEPFAR Fulfills Treatment and Care Commitments



In 2003, President George W. Bush launched the U.S. President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) to combat global HIV/AIDS – the largest commitment by any nation to combat a single disease in human history. Through PEPFAR, the U.S. Government has already provided \$18.8 billion in HIV/AIDS funding, and the U.S. Congress has authorized up to \$48 billion for HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis and malaria over the next five years.


### PEPFAR Latest Program Results

- **Ahead of schedule, the United States has fulfilled its commitment to support treatment for two million people.** As of **September 30, 2008**, through PEPFAR, the American people have supported life-saving antiretroviral treatment for more than **2.1 million men, women and children** living with HIV/AIDS around the world.
  - When President George W. Bush announced PEPFAR in 2003, it was estimated that **only 50,000 people** were receiving treatment for HIV/AIDS in sub-Saharan Africa. Through September 30, 2008, the American people through PEPFAR have supported treatment for more than forty times that number in the region – **more than 2 million men, women and children.**
  - Through PEPFAR, the American people supported treatment for approximately **2,007,800 people** through bilateral programs in PEPFAR's 15 focus countries in sub-Saharan Africa, Asia and the Caribbean.
- As of September 30, 2008, nearly **9.7 million people** affected by HIV/AIDS in PEPFAR's focus countries have received compassionate care, including nearly **4 million orphans and vulnerable children.** Using conservative projections, the American people have supported care for an estimated 10,072,100 people in PEPFAR's focus countries as of December 1, 2008. **Therefore, it is safe to say that the U.S. also has met the goal of supporting care for 10 million people affected by HIV.**
- **Nearly 240,000 babies** have been born free of HIV thanks to programs supported by the American people to prevent mothers from passing the virus on to their children. And PEPFAR supported a strategic prevention portfolio which includes Abstinence, Be faithful, and correct and consistent use of Condoms, providing ABC prevention messages in hundreds of millions of encounters.
- The American people through PEPFAR supported more than **57 million counseling and testing encounters** through fiscal year 2008.

<sup>1</sup>Included in downstream results are individuals reached through service delivery sites that are directly supported by USG interventions/activities (e.g. commodities, drugs, supplies, supervision, training or quality assurance) at the point of service delivery. Results are considered "downstream" if they can be associated with counts of uniquely identified individuals receiving services at unique program or service delivery points.

<sup>2</sup>Included in upstream results are estimates of individuals served as a result of the USG's contribution to systems strengthening beyond those counted as receiving direct USG support. Systems strengthening includes support to national, regional, or local activities such as policy development; institutional capacity building; logistics; protocol or guideline development; advocacy; laboratory support; national, regional training; and national management information systems. Upstream support is vital to creating sustainable national systems.

<sup>3</sup>Botswana results are attributed to the National HIV/AIDS Program. Beginning in FY2005, following a consensus reached between the USG and the Government of Botswana, USG reports its contributions in the form of a single national figure for each relevant indicator.

<sup>4</sup>All USG bilateral HIV/AIDS programs are developed and implemented within the context of multi-sectoral national HIV/AIDS strategies, under the host country's national authority. Programming is designed to reflect the comparative advantage of the USG within the national strategy, and it also leverages other resources, including both other international partner and private-sector resources. The number reported for other PEPFAR countries reflects the USG programs outside of the fifteen focus countries that provide direct support at the point of service delivery. Individuals outside of the focus countries receiving treatment as a result of the USG's contribution to systems strengthening beyond those counted as receiving direct USG support are not included in this total.
