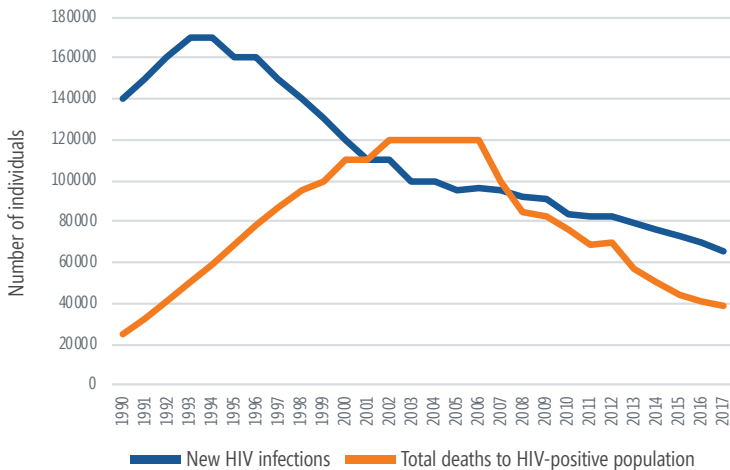


Tanzania

The U.S. government, through the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR), is partnering with the people and the Government of Tanzania to accelerate progress toward achieving HIV/AIDS epidemic control, with a focus on the following priorities:

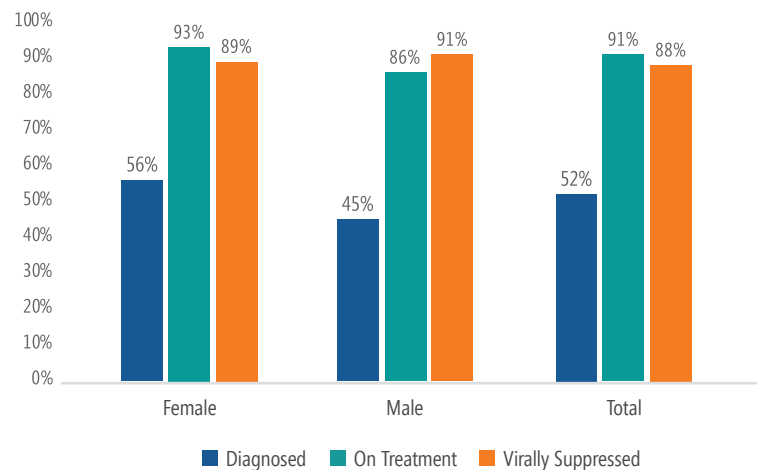
- Prioritizing high-yield, cost-efficient HIV case-finding strategies to increase HIV-positivity rates and reduce the cost per HIV infection diagnosed
- Improving linkage to and retention in HIV treatment through immediate initiation of antiretroviral therapy (ART), task-shifting, multi-month antiretroviral prescriptions, and other service delivery models to increase access to clinical care, decongest clinics, and permit the service scale-up necessary to achieve or exceed UNAIDS 90-90-90 targets
- Improving the monitoring and management of partner performance using detailed cost and outcomes data to identify and leverage successes for greater program impact
- Targeting priority populations such as adolescent girls and young women (AGYW) aged 25 or younger and men aged 35 or younger with efficient strategies for HIV prevention, testing, linkage to treatment, and viral suppression
- Scaling up evidence-based HIV prevention interventions by maximizing coverage across high-priority areas and expanding services to reach men aged 35 or younger
- Delivering Determined, Resilient, Empowered, AIDS-free, Mentored, and Safe (DREAMS) interventions to AGYW for reducing their risk of HIV infection
- Enhancing prevention and treatment programs for key populations (e.g., female sex workers, men who have sex with men, and people who inject drugs) through combination prevention activities
