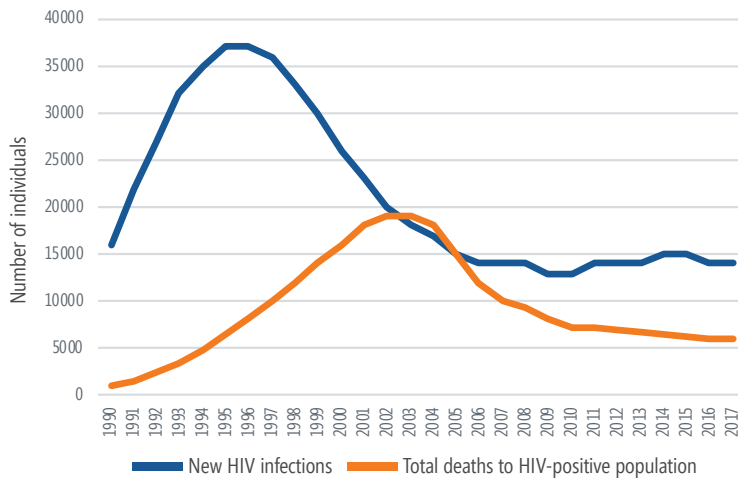


Botswana

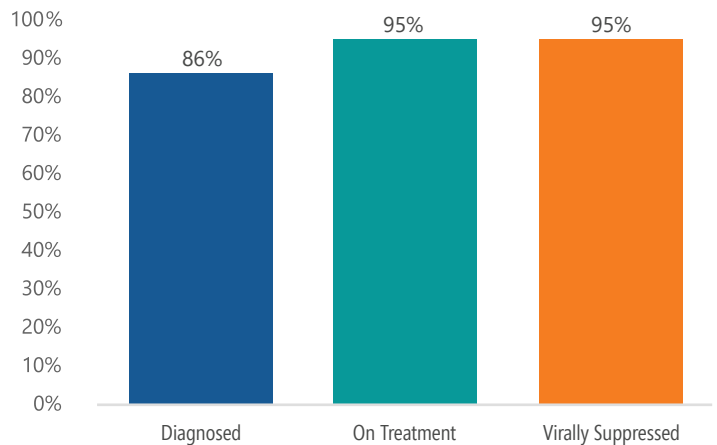
The U.S. government, through the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR), is partnering with the people and the Government of Botswana to accelerate progress toward achieving HIV/AIDS epidemic control, with a focus on the following priorities to decrease the number of new HIV infections to less than 7,500 annually:

- Achieving the full potential of the national Test and Start policy through provider training and patient HIV treatment literacy to ensure all persons living with HIV receive lifesaving antiretroviral treatment immediately following their diagnosis
- Focusing on those under age 30 with targeted case identification and creative prevention efforts through Determined, Resilient, Empowered, AIDS-free, Mentored, and Safe women (DREAMS) programming, which includes the introduction of pre-exposure prophylaxis for high-risk populations
- Scaling up high-yield HIV modalities, particularly in facilities and community contexts that reach men under age 35, persons with incident sexually transmitted infections, in-patients, and presumptive tuberculosis patients
- Enhancing laboratory services essential to early infant diagnosis and viral load monitoring for improved clinical outcomes for children and adults
- Increasing coverage of voluntary medical male circumcision services among those ages 10-49
- Focusing services in select sites for key populations, including female sex workers, men who have sex with men, and non-citizens
- Strengthening the Botswana Ministry of Health and Wellness electronic health information systems for improved interoperability, monitoring, and data-driven decision-making
