### PEPFAR Investment (FY 2004-2017): \$857,747,000

The U.S. government, through PEPFAR, is proud to partner with the people and Government of Zimbabwe in accelerating Zimbabwe's progress toward achieving HIV/AIDS epidemic control. In Fiscal Year 2018, with a focus on 40 high-burden districts in Zimbabwe to maximize impact, the partnership will include the following specific priorities:

- Increasing partner performance and impact by identifying and leveraging greater efficiencies through collection and use of more granular data
- Identifying new HIV-positive individuals through index testing (contact tracing) and innovative interventions such as HIV self-testing in order to better reach men and young adults
- Implementing Treat All, including expanded direct service delivery and differentiated models of care such as mobile antiretroviral treatment (ART) and same-day ART initiation
- Reaching at least 90 percent treatment coverage in 36 districts and 80 percent treatment coverage in four newly added PEPFAR districts
- Expanding efficient and effective testing strategies (e.g., expansion of high-yield and low-cost per positive identified) and treatment modalities (e.g., rapid scale up of differentiated service delivery models)
- Scaling up evidence-based prevention by targeting males ages 15-29 with voluntary medical male circumcision and increasing services where Determined, Resilient, Empowered, AIDS-free, and Safe (DREAMS) programs are already operating for vulnerable adolescent girls and young women
- Supporting activities for orphans and vulnerable children
- Enhancing key populations prevention and treatment programming by focusing primarily on female sex workers and men who have sex with men and for the first time integrating key populations services into public health facilities

Number of people living with HIV	<b>1,300,000</b>
Number of new HIV infections in 2016	<b>40,000</b>
Number of AIDS-related deaths in 2016	<b>30,000</b>
People living with HIV who know their status	<b>74%<sup>3,4</sup></b>
People who know their status and are on ART	<b>87%<sup>3,4</sup></b>
People on ART who have achieved viral suppression	<b>86%<sup>3</sup></b>
